## Indicative Content

This content serves as guidance and illustrative examples rather than a prescribed or exhaustive set of requirements

Learning Outcome 1 – Know what cyber security is and where it affects everyday life

Delivery could introduce everyday cyber threats such as suspicious messages, unsafe links, unknown contacts or websites, and explore how these threats may affect people through scams, misinformation, unwanted access or loss of data, and how cyber security helps protect people by keeping information private and warning them to think before clicking.

Learning Outcome 2 – Know simple safe behaviours online

Learners could explore simple safety rules such as not sharing names, addresses, passwords or locations, being careful with links or messages, speaking to someone when unsure, and understanding why it is important to check messages before opening them.

Learning Outcome 3 – Be able to follow simple cyber-safe actions

Delivery could involve guided practice such as checking a link before opening it, creating a basic password or choosing a safe option online, followed by reflecting on what they did, what went well and one thing to improve next time.
